The Trustee Visit to Kenya

Three trustees visited Kenya from 28th September to 8th October 2019. This trip was the first trustee visit for a few years so reconnecting with the leaders of The Salvation Army in both Kenyan Territories was high on the agenda as was the visits to projects the trust have worked on recently and seeing new proposed projects. Kenya West Territory: Headquarters in Kakamega

At the Kwirenyi Secondary School, about an hour from Kakamega, the trust had funded the refurbishment of the school dining hall with newly painted walls and the provision of dining tables and benches. Previously the children had to sit on the floor for their meals.



We then travelled over 3 hours to the William Booth Primary and Secondary Schools. Here the trust funded the construction of latrine blocks for boys and girls as well as providing water tanks for rain water collection.





Returning to Kakamega we stopped off at the Emurembe Primary School where the trust provided new latrine blocks for the students. Here the need for new desks was evident as one class were being taught seated on the floor while another class were taking a mock exam outside as their new classroom is not yet completed.



At the Kibos Primary and Secondary Schools for the

Blind in Kisumu we were shown a number of possible projects. The Kenya Trust has not supported these schools up to now and a project to help supply much needed Braille paper and for maintenance of their Braille machines is being started during our Christmas Appeal this year.





Kenya East Territory: Headquarters in Nairobi

The Trust built the Kosovo Nursery School in Mathare,

one of Nairobi's slums, and through the association and support of the Staines Rainbow Pre-School this project is ongoing.





Probably the high-light of the trip was the visit to the Njoro Special School about 2 hours drive from Nairobi.

This was a very inspirational place where the Head Teacher and staff do a wonderful job with the children and young adults in their care. The trust funded the construction of the girls' dormitory, housing 33 girls, and the Head wants us to build a second one. The school caters for 83 mentally





handicapped children. The trust has also provided toys and teaching aids to the school.

Other visits to projects in Kenya East were also made, details are on the website.



The swimming pool has been refurbished, new pump and chemicals supplied.

The borehole has been surveyed and work is underway to replace the pump.

New industrial lawn mower purchased to keep the grounds clear.







10 wheelchairs have been ordered. They are custom made for each child according to their needs.

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Featured Project: Joyland, Kisumu

During the trustees, visit, the last visit in Kenya West was to the Joyland Primary and Secondary Schools for the physically disabled.

The project at Joyland Primary School was as a result of a visit to the school in April 2019 by a Salvationist from Bedford Congress Hall, who visited Kisumu as part of another charity working with the Kenya Fire Service. Unbeknown to Melvyn Joyland was a Salvation Army School and was selected to receive some laptops provided by the charity. On learning that Melvyn was a Salvationist, the Chaplain at the school asked him if he knew of anyone who could help the school. On his return to Bedford he made contact with The Kenya Trust and so our summer project was initiated.

- The Swimming Pool circulation pump and chemicals were installed and the pool is again fit for purpose to provide hydro-therapy sessions for the children to recommence.
- The borehole pump is being replaced to allow for extraction of fresh water so as not to rely on costly municipal water.
- 3) The industrial lawn mower had been purchased.
- But the most significant discovery was that 10 of the promised 15 wheelchairs had been ordered. The wheelchairs are custom built to the child's needs and size.

Music Update:

In June of this year we sent a shipment of 18 brass instruments, 1 keyboard and a good number of tune books to the Kenya East Territory. These have now been distributed to corps bands outside of the capital Nairobi, and to corps which have not had bands before. This supports our aim to support the growth of The Salvation Army music ministry in the country.
