

Aims of The Kenya Trust

To assist in improving conditions and facilities at The Salvation Army's schools, hostels and community centres in Kenya, a country trying to cope with poverty, water shortage and widespread HIV/AIDS.

To promote and support the development of music within The Salvation Army in Kenya. The enthusiasm for music making in Africa is renowned and there is a continual need for musical instruments and music leadership training to support this Army's expression of evangelism.


THE TRUST'S 2007 SOCIAL PROJECT

Building seven classrooms, an administration block and other accompanying facilities at Irukose Primary School, Western Province, Vihega District, Shaviringa Location.

Project cost £36,000

Irukose Primary School was established on the 3rd of January 2004 to serve a population of 10,000 people. The nearest neighbouring school is some 6km away at Kaptisi and the distance (and subsequent difficulties) students had to travel to attend this school is the main reason for the establishment of Irukose Primary.

The current enrolment is 239 children with a projection of over 800 by 2010. The school also has a pre-primary unit of over 40 children. A temporary classroom block containing 3 classrooms has been erected by parents using mud and sticks.









Some classes are held in the open air. The Vihiga district is densely populated, consequently land holdings are small and household incomes and general food security are low. Rates of unemployment and illiteracy are high and HIV/AIDS has had a devastating impact on children and their families in the district, increasing the levels of poverty and vulnerability. Irukose Primary has many students who have lost parents or siblings to the disease. Other common diseases are malaria, typhoid and measles. Life expectancy is around the national average of 45 years.

The Kenya Trust has for its 2007/8 main project taken on the task of financing the construction of seven furnished classrooms. Other requirements as part of the project are pit latrines, a 5000 litre water tank and teaching materials.

MISSION THROUGH MUSIC

The annual Territorial Music School was again held at the Officer Training College, Thika during the first week of January 2007. Commencing on the 30th December enabled the students to celebrate new year together in true Kenyan style. For those fortunate to be there it was something to cherish and remember.



Each year we have seen the standard of musicianship improving and this year again produced a step up in performance. It was good to have the Territorial Band and Songster Leaders as part of the school staff. Thanks go to Bristol Easton Corps for helping to sponsor the school and also for providing t-shirts for all the students.





In November Trustees were represented at the Ordination, Commissioning and Appointment of new Salvation Army Officers which took place at the Kasarni International Sports Centre situated 10 Kilometeres north of Naroni, which also included the inauguration ceremony of the Territorial Band and Songsters. Letters of congratulation from the ISB and ISS were presented along with a full set of tune books from the ISB to the Kenya Territory Band (KTB). The Kenya Trust has supported the formation of the KTB through its Instrument scheme and in providing music. We pray for these sections as they seek to attract and introduce their listeners to the Christian way of life and the mission of The Salvation Army.
