This project may seem to have been a long time in the making. The trust started work to raise funds for this project in late 2021 and needed to raise more than £34,000 to complete it. Initially the project estimate was in the region of £22,000 but with the escalation in prices caused by the war in Ukraine and other factors the trust was faced with this huge, unexpected increase.

The project is now fully funded and nearing completion. It is expected that the opening ceremony will be sometime in April or May. It is a great achievement thanks to the generosity of so many people.





The latrine blocks at the primary school are almost complete. The block on the right is straight and square, it was just the cameraman put a slight slant on the image!

The building and furnishing of the two classrooms at the secondary school is also nearing completion. When built and operational the school will meet the requirements set out by the Ministry of Education in Kenya to qualify it to receive support and so improve the education of the 220 students. The before and after images are very stark. What an improvement!
