So much has happened since our last newsletter which was sent out in the Spring of this year.

We continue to be amazed and grateful for the financial support we get from so many of you who receive these communications, for those who make monthly contributions to our work and for those who give us one off donations from time to time - THANK YOU. Your gifts are not taken for granted, they make a huge difference in the lives of so many. I am reminded of the analogy of the pebble being dropped into the mill pond with its spreading ripples that go out over the surface of the water, your gifts have a tsunami ripple effect and touch so many.

Our 2022 projects which were initiated in November of 2021 have seemingly taken ages to complete, so many different issues had to be overcome, but finally both projects (the Primary School Latrine blocks and the Secondary School Classroom) have been completed and were officially opened on the 5th September.

A shipment of over 1,000kg of instruments has been sent to Kenya. Over 100 brass instruments, keyboards, and other instruments that have so kindly been donated to the trust have been cleaned, refurbished, maintained and many put back into playable condition. These are now in Kenya ready to be used.

Thank you to each and every one of you for making 2023 such a great year for The Kenya Trust.

I have now been part of the Kenya Trust for two years. My husband John and I attend Birmingham Citadel Corps. As well as singing in the senior choir I volunteer with the Modern

Slavery transport team to assist those people who are escaping their captors throughout the country.

I work in a Church of England First School in Penkridge where I teach Music and PE.

All things Kenya however, go back to 2013 when my school linked with the Lichfield Diocese's programme of global education. This resulted in six trips to northwest Kenya to observe, share and exchange with several Kenyan schools.

Of course, whilst education was the primary objective, I was introduced to Salvation Army locally as many head teachers and staff are committed Salvationists. Enjoying exuberant worship under a hot tin roof with torrential rain beating down, whilst dodging the occasional wanderings of cows and chickens has been a mostly enthralling experience!

I hope to continue working to enhance the Army and its work in Kenya through The Kenya Trust. Despite many difficulties in food insecurity, poor education facilities, lack of clean water and now climate change all mean the Army has vital work to do.

A simple phrase shows I want to help because I love God and God loves me!






Transformation..

.....Project 2023/4

Our Project 2023 is late starting due to the project over-run of our 2022 project, however, we are keen to progress straight on to the next support project. We are currently in communication with The Salvation Army's Kenya West Territorial Headquarters in Kakamega to discuss the details of two projects that have been proposed by them. Both projects are focused on education, which has been a recurring theme for The Kenya Trust in recent years. Project 1 is the Chombeli Workshop for Street Families which focuses on providing vocational skills to children and young adults who are caught up in homelessness. Project 2 is to replace the roof at the Chekombero Special Needs School for the Deaf. Our next newsletter will fill you in on the details and progress.

Music Ministry Support.. Another tonne of musical opportunity exported to Kenya

We continue to support The Salvation Army's music ministry in Kenya with annual exports of donated brass band instruments. This year's consignment consisted of over 1 tonne or 146 instruments and boxes of tune books.

We are, as ever, grateful to all the donors who give instruments and to those who donate specifically towards transport costs as these are extensive. We've had instruments this year from as far and wide as Barrow-in-Furness, Torquay, Brixham, Birchington, Plymouth, Cambridge Heath, Salvation Army THQ and DHQs and from individuals who have gifted their own pre-loved instruments.

Each item is checked and overhauled as necessary to bring it back to playing order by Charley Brighton before I weigh, measure, packaging and prepare the paperwork for export. Transport costs are calculated by the kilo and size, so a tuba is £55, a dumpier but heavier euphonium is £80 compared to a cornet/trumpet at £15-20 each, the 'middle of the band' somewhere in between. Music is heavy, about £30 per box of books!
