## Meet The Trustees Major Ian Loxley



I clearly remember disembarking SS Uganda in July 1962 and walking along the quayside in Mombasa. The noise, smells, heat, and the Swahili language created an indelible impression on this six-year-old. There then followed the overnight journey

by steam train to Nairobi, with virtually no chance of sleep. The train seemed to stop every few miles to pick up or drop off passengers and to give opportunity for those standing beside the tracks to sell fruit, vegetables and woodcarvings to passengers through the open windows.

This was my introduction to Kenya - the beautiful country I grew to love over the following five years. My Kenyan experience was a precious gift and it was certainly the case that, to paraphrase the song: 'I left my heart in Kenya'.

The opportunity to return didn't come until Ken Clark invited me to accompany him and Patricia Owen to teach at two music training events in 2002 and again in 2014. My passion for Kenya was reignited, and I resolved to do more to support the work of The Salvation Army in Kenya through The Kenya Trust.

Last year I retired from my role as a Corps Officer in the UK, a calling from God I first felt while living in Nairobi.

Despite retirement being much busier than expected with part-time work and family commitments, I have been able to fundraise for the Kenya Trust and to accept the invitation to become a trustee.

What a joy it is to be able to give a little back to the wonderful people of Kenya from whose country I received so much!

Christing Bryant joined the then 'Music for Kenya Fund' in 1998. In 2004 it became The Kenya Trust. Christine has served as the treasurer for both the Music for Kenya Fund and for The Kenya Trust for over 25 years and now reluctantly has decided to retire.

Christine visited Kenya with a group of trustees in 2006 for the inauguration of the Territorial Songsters and Band, the Kenya Trust having supplied the band instruments. This was her only visit to Kenya but it gave Christine a valuable opportunity to see first hand the work she and the trust were accomplishing in Kenya. Christine has helped organise a number of fundraising concerts at Briston Easton Salvation Army raising thousands of pounds for the cause. Christine always worked hard but quietly in the background, handling and sending funds, chasing bank queries and compiling the Gift Aid claims every year. A hard act to follow.

#### Christine recalls:

"The account payment of £200 was my first action as Treasurer for The Salvation Army Music for Kenya Fund, later to become The Kenya Trust. As you read this Newsletter you will realise the truth of those 'tiny acorns' for I never envisaged, when I made that modest deposit, that I would one day be sending tens of thousands of pounds, to a Nairobi bank, for projects to improve the health, living conditions and education of thousands of Kenyans."

The trust would like to take this opportunity to recognise and say 'Thank You' to Christine for the huge impact she has had on the work of the trust and especially the direct impact her work has had on improving the lives of so many in Kenya.

Thank you, Christine, or as many in Kenya would say: "Asante sana".

## **Project Updates**

#### **Chekombero Primary School for the Deaf**

The project is progressing well. The Salvation Army in Kenya West Territory has secured additional funding from a charitable foundation in Kenya that has enabled them to push this project "over the line" and dramatically increase the scope of work. We look forward to being able to share pictures of the completed project early next year.

#### **Instrument Shipment 2024**



The shipping of instruments has been the backbone of our aim to support the growth and enhancement of the music ministry of The Salvation Army in Kenya. Since its inception as 'The Salvation Army Music for Kenva Fund' in 1998. the Kenya Trust has collected. repaired and shipped musical

instruments to The Salvation Army in Kenya. Most have been donated by individuals or bands in the UK. Although mainly brass instruments, guitars and keyboards are also sent. In order to keep shipping costs to a minimum shipments are made once a year. This year's consignment will be of 106 instruments and is scheduled to leave the UK in December. It is estimated that the cost for this shipment will be just over £4,000.


